

HTML Creative Website Project

This is your chance to research and create a website dedicated to the topic of your choice. You will create the website using Notepad and the HTML editor available in your lab. HTML editors allow you to hand-code HTML or to work in a visual editing environment, where you can drag and drop items similar to desktop editing software. The visual editing features quickly create pages without writing a code.

Suggested Topics Include:

Music/Band site, Sports site, Food/Recipe site, About me site, Videogame site, Movie/Tabloid Site
All topics must be approved and meet the code of conduct.

Must Contain:

- An appropriate topic of choice
- An approved detailed **Web Diagram** and **Web Sketch**
- 1 Home Page & At Least 6 Secondary Pages (At least 1 created in text editor)
- A Navigation bar
- 5 Relative Paths & 3 Absolute Paths & 1 Email Link
- 15 JPGs, 5 GIFs
- At least 1 image that you took from a digital camera **or** 1 that you scanned
- 2 tables
- FAQ Page
- Creativity and Effort and following good design principles

Should Contain:

- Uniform look throughout the website
- Background colours
- Different fonts
- Different type styles

Things you may need to know:

Web Diagram

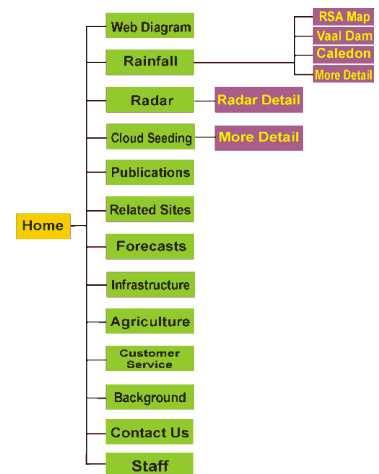
Shows the hierarchy of the website. Often complications are thought out on paper before you waste your time designing them in Dreamweaver. The Web Diagram shows how each page connects with each other. You may be given a web diagram template slightly different than the one to the right.

Web Sketch

Accompanying your diagram should be a well drawn out sketch of your homepage. Include all buttons, links, pictures and text that you wish to have on your home page. Must be drawn in Pencil (or black pen) and be done on plain white paper.

Images

If you are using an image that you created from a paint program like Adobe Photoshop make sure you size the image to 72 DPI. Make sure the image is in the RGB colour space and that it is named with the extension .GIF or .JPG depending on the type of file it is. Images downloaded from another website should have these requirements met already.



Relative Paths

A Relative path is an address for a document that is located somewhere relative to the document you are writing. (usually within your website) Chances are you have many relative paths in your website without even knowing it. Check your code. For example "newline/returnoftheking"

Absolute Paths

An absolute path gives the absolute address-exactly which machine, what directory and what file it is looking for. You usually use absolute paths when you are linking to a file from another website or server. For example: "http://www.apple.com/trailers/newline/returnoftheking"

Make sure you include <http://> when linking to outside websites.
